Problem of College Education

I. Introduction.

Since independence several Commissions and Committees were appointed by the Government of India to look into the existing educational pattern in the country and to suggest measures for its improvement. The Radhakrishnan Commission, the Mudaliar Commission and the Kothari Commission have all gone very deep into the existing pattern and the problems of the University, the secondary and the comprehensive system of education prevalent in the country and recommended several measures for improvement of the standard of education after the rough enquiry and deliberations.

The newly introduced 10+2+3 system of educational pattern in the country as a whole with greater emphasis on learning Mathematics, Social Studies, Science together with Work Experience in the School stage has necessitated a fresh look into the courses and syllabus at the College level.

II. The new Pattern of College Education.

The H.S.L.C. Examination with new syllabus after 10 years of schooling was held in 1976. The successful students have now taken admission in the 1st year Pre-Degree class or in the 11th year in the 12 year Higher Secondary class. It is, however, surprising to see that although the school syllabus was completely overhanded and although the products of the new system have entered the college level, the old

2 years Pre-Degree courses were retained in the colleges. No urgency was shown by the Universities to receive the products of new system with revised courses and corrienda.

Only when they were required to introduce the 3 year Degree programme instead of the existing two year programme, they became aware of their responsibilities to some extent. Even then attempts were made to revive the old 3 years Degree Programme (which was linked with one year Pre-Degree Course). The consensus now seems to be to have the Honours Course for 3 years and Pass Course for 2 years. Because of the addition of one year to the existing 2 years Honours Course, the scope to introduce new material in the curriculum has increased. As only the Honours graduates will now be admitted in the Master Degree programme, which will continue to have 2 years duration, the corresponding changes in the Master Degree courses will also be necessary to avoid duplication of the same subject matter. Under the new pattern in the P.G. level new courses will have to be added and or some research work will have to be introduced.

The framing of new courses to suit the new condition is to be done after a thorough discussion with the experienced teachers, experts and policy makers. It will also be necessary to ensure inter-University uniformity in the basic courses. Along with the revision of courses in the Pre-Degree level, it will also be necessary to revise courses and syllabie in Medical, Engineering, Agriculture and Veterinary Colleges which admit only the Pre-Degree passed students. Till now no discussion at the national or state level has been made to co-ordinate the efforts of various organisations imparting technical education in the country with the institution offering basic courses.

III Responsibilities of the Colleges.

Before the introduction of 10+2+3 system, the colleges were in-charge of student for 4 years—2 years in Pre-Degree

and 2 years in Degree level. Under the new system the colleges will have to take the responsibilities of students for 2 years at the Pre-Degree level and 3 years at the Degree level. As a result the strength of the teaching staff in the colleges, atleast for the subjects taught in the Degree level, will have to be increased; but there will not be any increase in the fees income from students as enrolment in the degree level is much lower than the Pre-Degree courses. Moreover, many of the existing colleges with degree classes may not be well equipped and suitable institutions for imparting higher education at the degree level with increased course load.

Under the new system the teaching programme at the graduate level will have to be more specialised and intensive. In the Pre-Degree level also, the courses will have to be more co-ordinated. In this context there is an urgent need to train college teachers to shoulder the new responsibilities through refreshers courses, Workshop and seminars.

Introduction of some element of internal assessment, both at the University and College level, have also necessitated mutual discussion and formulation of guidelines to avoid discrimination and haphazard evaluation. The decision of the Universities to adopt semester system of Education, if introduced at the college level, will need much more thinking, planning and organisation, apart from additional equipment, staff, laboratory and other physical facilities. Whatever may be the case, the country will have to adopt better teaching and evaluation techniques in higher education to avoid the colossal wastage and indifference.

IV. Need of Leadership by the University.

In the state of Assam the Dibrugarh and the Gauhati Universities are the affiliating Universities. They are the principal institutions at the apex to look after the higher collegiate education in the State. But whether the two

Universities are yet fully aware of their responsibilities ? There is a feeling among many people that the Universities are mainly concerned with holding examinations, collecting examination fees and sending inspecting teams to colleges. All these activities are mainly aimed at augmenting the University finance. It is complained that not a fraction of the interest shown by the Universities in Post Graduate teaching is bestowed on college level teaching.

The Universities cannot claim any credit for improving teaching in any subject in the affiliated colleges. Although Faculties of Studies and Academic Councils at the University level are concerned with framing syllabus appointing examiners, suggesting amendment of the existing rules, the concerned teachers of the subjects at the college level are not involved in the process. Occasional Workshop at the regional centres for each subject or group of subjects under different disciplines (*e.g.* Social Sciences, Humanities and Language, Biological Sciences, Physical Sciences, Mathematical Science etc.) may be organised by the Universities to improve the course content and teaching methods through mutual discussion and co-operation amongst teachers, experts and the University's policy makers. If this is not done immediately, the students will suffer in future. Mere change of syllabi will not improve the standard of teaching. Because of the absence of such discussion at the school level much harm has already been done to the school students in regard to teaching of newly introduced subject like Social Studies, Advanced Mathematics, Work experience. We must try to avoid this at the college level.

With the introduction of Assamese as a medium of instruction for college education, both the Universities in Assam have taken a good deal of interest in the preparation of text books with the liberal financial help from the Central Government. But because of the hurried planning and urgency to publish books immediately, many text books have not attained

the desired standard with regard to contents and also presentation of the subject matter. Much of the error and unplanned presentation could have been avoided had the Text Book Production Cell for each subject takes some more care with regard to choice of writers and editors, manner of presentation and contents of text book. Moreover, some co-ordination between the two Universities is also essential. So that instead of duplicating efforts, each can specialise in one field and complement the efforts of the other Universities. This is not difficult as in many cases, the same persons have been serving the same Cell in both the Universities.

V. Need of Good Teachers.

Teaching in an effective manner is a special and difficult art. A teacher must be able to inspire and guide students in their quest for knowledge and in their efforts to become responsible citizens of the country in future. Good teachers are respected and remembered by both the students and the public.

The University Grants Commission has now taken steps to attract brilliant persons to the teaching profession by sanctioning higher scales of pay to University and College teachers. The emphasis on first class or research degree is only to ensure recruitment of brilliant persons to the teaching profession. But recruitment of brilliant persons alone cannot ensure continued interest with sincerity to improve teaching faculties. Moreover, under the present system of examination the first class degree alone should not be considered as an indication of proficiency. Even the standard of first class degree differs from University to Universities and from subject to subject. Although the Ph. D. degree is an indication of aptitude for research and of high academic attainment in a particular branch of learning, how far it is helpful in undergraduate teaching is debatable. Apart from the problem of maintaining high standard of teaching, it is also inconcievable

to have two sets of scales of pay for teachers doing same type of job according to the academic qualification attained in a distant past. The high percentage of aggregate marks in Master Degree Examination may be due to very high score in a particular paper which has no relevance to the teaching programme in the Under Graduate level. This may hold good in case of the Ph.D. degree also. Unless the facilities for library work is extended ; seminars, workshops and refreshers' courses are arranged ; it will be difficult to improve the standard of teaching. Short term training in centres of excellence may also improve the abilities of teachers in their job.

At present there is no means to judge the ability of a teacher as a teacher. In advanced countries certain methods are adopted for evaluation of teachers. Some of these methods may not be applicable in India due to the prevalence of a great deal of personal considerations in our day to day dealings. But it is also essential to evolve some criteria to reward good teachers, atleast not to denigrate them in public esteem because of their performance in examination several years back. There are instances of evasion of responsibilities by teachers with brilliant academic record who have engaged themselves in writing text books, examining answer scripts of various Universities and acting as Officer in Charge of Examination, etc. The present situation needs immediate attention so that we can place greater emphasis on improving ability to impart knowledge to students in more effective manner.

VI. Recruitment of Teachers.

The Government of Assam has now taken the responsibility of selecting a panel of College Teachers for each subject. The Selection Board constituted by the State Government has, by and large, discharged its responsibility efficiently and

impartially by selecting the meritorious candidates. At the same time the College Governing Bodies have also retained some degree of freedom to select candidates out of the panel according to their own judgement. But the delay caused in the preparation and publication of the selected list of candidates in the panel created problem for the Governing Bodies. Because of the urgent necessity and possibilities of dislocation of the teaching programme, the College authorities were sometimes compelled to appoint teachers on purely temporary basis. But if such temporarily selected persons are not permanently absorbed in future, it creates delicate situation. Sometimes even when brilliant persons are available locally, the colleges had to recruit inferior candidates from the already prepared list as the new list including the fresh candidates is not prepared. The State Government should try to publish the list of panel as soon as possible and new names to the list should be added on a continuous basis. So that brilliant students can have the chance to serve the college after the publication of their results. It is also necessary to keep the list valid for two years as persons included in the earlier list might prefer to await one year instead of applying for selection immediately after the publication of the list in response to another fresh advertisement. If the list is kept alive for two years and if new names are continuously added, there will be ample opportunity for the candidates to seek employment and at the same time the college authorities will also have the freedom to select fresh candidates.

In case of non deficit colleges the Governing Bodies had to recruit persons locally or persons with inferior qualifications as they cannot offer Government Scales as prevalent in the deficit colleges. This has created problem in subsequent years when the colleges are taken by the Government under the deficit system. When a particular college comes under the deficit-system, the Government tries to enforce the qualifications prescribed for teachers in deficit college with Honours

in Graduate level and high second class in Master Degree level. But many of the existing teachers in the non deficit colleges have come to the college after a great deal persuasion by the college authorities. Many had to remain content with partly sum of money for several years. But the college has become eligible for deficit grants only through the sacrifice and service of these teachers. It is, therefore, unfair to tell them that they do not possess the requisite qualification and that they seek employment elsewhere. To improve the college education, greater emphasis be placed on checking the mushroom growth of colleges which were sponsored on local considerations, but which are able only to provide instructional facilities in Pre-Degree Arts courses in a limited number of subjects. No harm will be caused if expansion of this type of collegiate education is stopped. Greater stress be given only to improve the existing colleges which are not yet able to offer facilities for science teaching, even in the Pre-Degree level. As entrance qualification in all the technical colleges is the Pre-Degree in Science, many student in backward rural areas are deprived of higher technical education due to the absence of facilities for learning science in the Pre-Degree level locally.

The recruitment of teachers in the Universities is also haphazard. The standard fixed by different Universities and also for different subjects and categories of posts very greatly. The conduct of the experts in the Selection Boards also raises doubts about their impartiality. This might be due to the lack of local candidates or eagerness of the University authorities to prevent promotion of a particular person or to accommodate some other interest. But complaints against recruitment by the Universities are also raised on many occasions. It is high time to explore the possibility of constitution of an Inter University Selection Committee in the manner of the Public Service Commission consisting of well respected academicians, experts nominated by the U.G.C., I.C.A.R. and

nominees of the three Universities. At the time of selection of candidates for a particular University, the concerned Vice-Chancellor and Dean or Head of the Department may be associated to guide the Selection Board. If this is followed some degree of uniformity and impartiality will also be maintained and the Vice-Chancellor of the Universities will be relieved from this onerous task of interviewing candidate frequently. In that case they will be able to give more time for improvement of academic atmosphere in their institutions and encourage resarch on several directions.

VII. Conclusion.

In the pre independence days Assam had only two colleges (1) Cotton College at Gauhati and (2) Jagannath Borooh College at Jorhat. The Cotton College was started by the State Government in 1901. But the J.B. College come into existance through the efforts and sacrifice of a few brilliant Master Degree holders in 1930. The experience of J.B. College inspired the youngmen in Assam only in the post war years. Through their efforts of voluntary organisations many colleges have sprang up in post war years,—some of which have now proved as very good centres of teaching.

It is my personal opinion that except in backward regions, the growth of colleges, mainly Arts colleges, should be checked. The resources should be diverted to equip the existing colleges so that they can provide facilities for higher education in Arts, Science and Commerce. Only in backward regions where no such facilities exist, the Govt. should try to establish new colleges. It will also be proper in these area to encourage voluntary organisation to establish colleges.

With the introduction of new system of education in the country with 5 years in the college level, the responsibilities of the colleges have increased greatly. The colleges should be helped and encouraged to discharge the responsibility effi-

ciently by the State Government, U.G.C. and the affiliating Universities. The crux of the problem seem to be the dearth of efficient teacher who can impart the upto-date knowledge to student with ease, sympathy and complete understanding of students' problem and difficulties.

The Universities should involve teachers from affiliated colleges more intimately in the preparation of syllabi and text books. Universities should also provide facilities to teachers to improve their professional competence through refreshers course, workshops, seminar. The lecturer in affiliated colleges should occasionally stay in the University campus and discuss their problems with experts in the Universities and also work in the University libraries. If necessary, liberal financial assistance be provided to college to depute teachers during vacation for such purposes. Physical facilities in form of teaches hosted, laboratory, library space etc. will also need expansion. A fresh look into the existing system of recruitment is also called for. It is hoped that the newly constituted Education Commission by the Government of Assam will consider all aspects of collegiate education in the State.

The Birth of Mangaldai College

I was Sub-Divisional Officer, Mangaldai from August 1950 to July, 1952. If I remember a right, it was sometime in the middle of 1951 that two young lawyers whose names I cannot recollect just now approached me with the request to explore the possibilities of starting an Intermediate Arts College in Mangaldai in view of the extreme backwardness of the Sub-division in the matter of education. The number of graduates in the Sub-division at the time could be counted at the finger's end. The number of H.E. Schools in the Sub-division was too small in those days and that in my opinion being an insurmountable obstacle in the way of starting a college, I dismissed the two gentlemen with the usual official reply that I would look into the question. The matter rested there. It so happened that sometime later I had to go to Dhubri on some official business and had the then Principal of the Dhubri College as a co-passenger in my compartment of the train from Gauhati. He was an old acquaintance of mine. I casually talked to him about the feasibility of starting a college in Mangaldai giving him my own ideas about it. He was a retired Professor of the Cotton College, Gauhati and was an educationist of fame in Assam. We had a long exchange of views and I was ultimately convinced about the unsoundness of my ideas. On my return to Mangaldai, I sent for the aforesaid two lawyers and asked them to convene a meeting of the leading gentlemen of the town to discuss the question of starting a college. A meeting was

accordingly arranged in the Town Hall sometime in June 1951 (I am not sure about the month after such a long lapse of time) and was presided over by me. Most of the speakers were of the opinion that in view of the very limited number of feeder schools, it was not possible to start a college in Mangaldai. Armed with the briefing by the aforesaid Principal of the Dhubri College I, in my presidential speech, told the meeting that it was quite within the range of possibility to have a college and assured the meeting that I would present the people of Mangaldai with an Intermediate Arts College within that year. I set about the task of collecting funds which was the first and foremost step towards the fulfilment of my promise. In this matter I had the fullest co-operation of my official colleagues, the most enterprising and active being my Senior E.A.C. Shri Sarat Chandra Barua, and some leading members of the public. We ran from one end of the Sub-division to the other collecting funds and the response from the people was spontaneous. Within a short space of time we collected a sizeable fund which paved a strong base for start of the college. It was perhaps in the month of September, 1951 that we could start a night college in the premises of the Govt. H.E. School. As it was not possible for us to recruit regular professors at the initial stage, we appointed Shri Purandar Sarma, M.A.B.L., a practising lawyer and an M. L. A. as the Principal of the infant college which post he gladly accepted as a labour of love. Some leading members of the Bar with a good educational career behind them and one H.E. School teacher who was an M.A. in Assamese offered their voluntary services to work as professors till the funds of the college permitted appointment of regular professors. The enrolment in the first year was naturally poor. I had to enthruse two of my best office assistants to take admission by giving them lighter duties. One of the two wrote me a nice letter after graduating from the College. The drive for funds went on unabated. Some regular profe-

ssors were appointed in due course. The Site where the college stands now was selected during my time but the exigencies of Government service did not allow me the privilege of seeing the college on that site. When I left Mangaldai on transfer in August, 1952, the college had a fund of about 48 thousand rupees (I stand subject to correction).

I am extremely happy to learn that the college which had a very humble beginning is today a fullfledged institution and is celebrating its Silver Jubilee. All these years I have very keenly watched the progress of the college which is perhaps one of the best in Assam now. I feel proud to think that the seed I sowed has grown into a mighty tree and that Mangaldai is no longer backward in the field of education as in other fields. I regret very much that I could not give the names of all the gentlemen who worked heart and soul for starting the college. This is due to my old age and I beg to be excused. I wish the Mangaldai college a very bright future.

Mangaldai College :

A Short Retrospect

I am grateful to the Convenor, Souvenir Sub-Committee, for asking me to write a short history of Mangaldai College, specially of its past, on the occasion of its 'Silver Jubilee Celebration' and I have great pleasure in doing it.

Where there is a will to do a thing, the means for the doing that thing are strenuously sought after and easily and spontaneously discovered. This belief weighted with the founders when they undertook to establish a college at Mangaldai, about twenty five years ago. Education in our country is, by at large, the outcome of non-Governmental efforts specially in the rural areas and if we were to have an institution for higher education, the initiative must come from the public. It was the energy of intention that mattered.

Another consideration which the founders had in mind was that we must learn to depend on ourselves, and not look to other for help every time, we were in trouble. Of course, we welcomed help and co-operation from every quarter but we must depend primarily on ourselves and on our own resources, when we set about doing something substantial. Some people get into the habit of criticizing others without doing anything themselves. But nothing can come from that type of criticism.

When the decision to establish a college at Mangaldai was taken in June, 1951, we had no building, no teaching staff and practically nothing by way of resources to rely upon

and in my position as Principal of the college, the difficulties seemed apparently insurmountable.

The new session had already begun and other colleges had started functioning in the usual way from July, and our consuming obsession was how best we could serve our cause and give a start to the college without losing a single day. As there was hardly any time to appoint the teaching staff, we decided to draw on our own resources and the response was indeed spontaneous. Shri Satyesh Dasgupta, Advocate, offered his services to teach English, Shri Rameswar Sarma who had already agreed to serve as secretary, also offered to teach Civics, Late Bakdul Ali volunteered his services to teach Persian and History, Late Shri Dharmanath Shastri, Shri Bhabananda Rajkhowa and Shri Sachin Bose undertook to teach Sanskrit, Vernacular languages and Logic. I also offered my services to act as Principal in an honorary capacity.

The question of building accommodation was solved by deciding to hold the classes temporarily in the premises of the local library. Late Rajani Kanta Sarma, offered a sum of Rs. 101.00 (Rupees one hundred one) to meet incidental expenses. Shri Jiban Ch. Sarma, then an office assistant of Local Board, offered his services to work as an office assistant on a mere pittance. The Governing Body was constituted with Shri A.B. Dasgupta I.A.S. (S.D.O.) as President, Shri R. Sarma as Secretary and with almost all the founders of the college as members. Thus for all intents and purposes the nucleus of a college was formed and in a few days college started functioning. Altogether 60 students were admitted into the 1st year class amongst whom were Late Shri Bhog Ram Patowary, an advocate of the local Bar and his daughter Bidyawati. It was a pleasant surprise to me when both father and daughter sat together in the same class room to attend lectures. The subjects introduced were English, Civics, Assamese, Bengali, History, Logic, Sanskrit and Persian. Amongst the students who had been admitted in the early stages of the

college were Shri Siba Prasad Rajkhowa, now District and Session Judge, Assam, Shri Siba Prasad Das and Shri Tapan Kumar Bhowmik, at present both Senior members of Assam Civil Service, Shri Gobinda Ram Barooah, Asstt. Public Prosecutor, Mangaldai, Shri Jiban Ch. Sarma, Shri Debesh Chandra Nandi, Smt. Naharun Nessa and Smt. Amiya Devi all lecturers of Mangaldai college, Shri Tapeswar Saharia and Shri Tapeswar Sarma at present both in Assam Civil Service and Shri Benudhar Sarma, Shri Nagen Choudhury, Shri Bireswar Sarma, Shri Dinanath Deka of S.D.O.'s office, Mangaldai, Shri Hahi Ram Nath, Head Master, Mangaldai Town Girls' High School, Shri Bhadreswar Nath, Head Master, Paschim Rangamati High School, Shri Sourindra Bose, Miss Premalata Deka, Shri Siba Sarma, Head of the Department of Political Science of Goalpara college, Smt. Sabita Hazarika, Shri Dibakar Sarma, Head master Pakadali High School, Shri Harendra Nath Sarma, Head master Tangla High School and many others whose names I cannot call to mind at this moment. The first batch appeared in the final I.A. Examination in 1953, the percentage of pass being 34.4—3 students passing out in the first division. The result naturally gave us great satisfaction and strength for future endeavour. Meanwhile there was an appreciable increase in enrolment and we had to shift the classes to Mangaldai Govt. High School—with the permission of the authorities.

We now approached the University authorities for granting permanent affiliation but they insisted on our having whole time teachers, a Reserve fund of Rs. 15,000.00, a well equipped library and sufficient lands and buildings as a condition precedent to affiliation. But it was not an easy job to recruit qualified teachers in the existing circumstances. Advertisements were issued in the dailies both within and outside Assam, inviting applications for the post of Principal and lecturers in different subjects ; but the response was not very encouraging. Candidates for the Post of Principal de-

manded exorbitant amount as salary and in the circumstances, I had to continue as Principal without any remuneration for over 10 years. Often I had to teach English, Civics and Commercial Geography to meet the exigency of circumstances. In course of time however, we were able to appoint lecturers in different subjects but not in English on a permanent basis. Two lecturers in English were appointed from outside Assam but each of them left the college within a year of their appointment. This had an ugly impact on the academic life of the college. No one was available to teach English and a sense of frustration prevailed all around. At this juncture Smt. Ushasi Ghosh an educated lady of Mangaldai town was prevailed upon to resign her post in Handique Girls' College and join our college as lecturer at a great sacrifice.

It was difficult to get suitable lands within the town or outside its immediate neighbourhood. The present site which is away from the din and bustle of the town with the magnificent Himalayas silhouetted on the northern horizon and the mighty Brahmaputra to the south, formed part of a village grazing reserve in Upahupara Village. It was a compact block comprising an area of more or less 50 bighas of high lands. The Inspector of Colleges, Dr. A.K. Barkakati hailed it as an ideal site for an educational institution. Accordingly a proposal was submitted to Government for dereservation of the V.G.R. for providing lands to the college. The village people raised a hue and cry against the dereservation. This delayed matters but in the long run their resistance calmed down and we were able to take permission, possibly in the year 1953. Our Secretary, Shri R. Sharma lost no time in taking formal possession of the lands from the Revenue Department and to get the boundaries demarcated.

We were now in a position to start construction of college buildings but we had yet another difficulty to overcome. The building materials namely C.I. sheets, rods, cement etc. were in short supply and not available in the local market

without a permit from the Government. I had therefore to proceed to Shillong on several occasions to obtain permits for these controlled commodities. As a matter of fact cement had to be brought down from Rangapara and Barpeta, and timber from Palashbari, iron materials and C.I. sheets from Calcutta by road. It was an uphill task ; nevertheless, we succeeded in doing it and I am indebted to Shri G.N. Thakuria, Vice-Principal and Shri Mahsin Ali, Head Assistant for the assistance they rendered in this connection.

The foundation stone of the college buildings was laid by Late K.K. Phookan, I.A.S., S.D.O. Mangaldai amidst great rejoicings. The buildings completed we were able to shift college to a new campus in 1956. Incidentally I may relate an amusing event that occurred at this time. We needed a man to look after the buildings at night and in fact appointed one for the purpose. He worked for a few days but left his job saying that the place was haunted by ghosts. Another man was appointed but he also resigned and went away for the same reason. Soon a rumour spread that the college campus was haunted by ghosts. I was really at a loss but Bhajan present chawkidar of the college saved the situation. He was a brave man and offered to serve as a night watch inspite of the fear and horror associated with ghosts and I am indebted to him for his exemplary courage and devotion to duty.

In 1958 the State Govt. was pleased to sanction a monthly recurring grant of Rs. 1000.00 (Rupees one thousand) in aid the college. In 1960, the college received affiliation of Gauhati University upto the B.A. degree course. The State Govt. was also pleased to include the college under the deficit system of grant with effect from 1962-63. In the same year the college was included in the scheme of development by the University Grants Commission for financial assistance for the introduction of three year degree course, for which an assistance of Rs. 1,60,000.00 (Rupees one lakh sixty thousand only) was sanctioned on share basis. We are indebted to the

U.G.C. for the generous contribution since it enabled us to construct the main college building and open B.Sc. degree course and also Honours courses in English, Political Science, Economics, Assamese and History. The college was now on a stable foundation with a full complement of staff equipments and accommodation.

The Silver Jubilee Celebration has made it possible for me to express my deep appreciations of the valuable share to the successive sub-divisional officers who contributed to the growth and development of the college and in special, of their skilful planning for collection of funds. In this connection the names of Shri A.B. Dasgupta I.A.S. (Rtd.), Shri J.N. Das I.A.S. now V.C., Dibrugarh University, Shri B.K. Bhuyan, I.A.S., Late K.K. Phookan I.A.S., Shri H.N. Das, I.A.S., Shri R. Natarajan, I.A.S., and Shri Saradindu Sarkar A.C.S., deserve special mention. All of them acted as President of the Governing Body which met frequently and sometimes twice in a month.

To acknowledge all the assistance received in connection with the establishment of the college would be impossible, for help was received from innumerable individuals over a period of years. The highest amount we received was upto Rs. 1250/- from individuals and the donors were Shri Bhagi Ram Deka of Bhergaon (Rs. 1001/-) Late Phani Bhusan Bose of Tangla (Rs. 1001/-) and Late Karim Bux of Mangaldai town who contributed a sum of Rs. 1250/-. His son Shri Kalimuddin Ahmed was kind enough to construct the main gate of the college at a cost of about Rupees Seven thousand. We also received substantial amounts from the lessees of markets, fisheries and liquor shops. We are indebted to Shri Tape-swar Sarma, Raisaheb Suklal Ghose, Late Bipin Ch. Medhi, Late Gangadhar Deka, Late Basab Chandra Barua, Late Padmananda Goswami, Shri Dandi Ram Dutta, Late Badaruddin Ahmed, Late Mukti Nath Goswami, Shri Hiralal Patwary, Ex. M.L.A., Shri D.P. Khargaria, Secretary I.N.T.U.C.

Mangaldai Branch, Shri Sandhi Ram Saharia, our present Principal Shri P.C. Goswami and numerous other well wishers who have rendered valuable services for the growth and establishment of the college. I acknowledge in particular the assistance given by Shri Rameswar Sarma who served this institution as Secretary to the Governing Body for upwards of 15 years with indefatigable zeal and energy. As a matter of fact his is the biggest contribution to the college.

I have been intimately associated with this college for nearly twenty four years in my capacity as Principal, Secretary and as a member of the Governing Body. During these years we have experienced failures and achievements, hopes and disappointments but the good work we have done will remain even though we pass away.

We are living in an age in which there are great opportunities for our young men in social work, public life and administration. It is my earnest hope that this college will give them not only elements of general knowledge but also that bent of mind and attitude of reasons, which will make them responsible citizens of our country.

Some Aspects Of The Role Of Mangaldai College

Amidst enthusiasm, the people of Mangaldai, under the guidance of the local intelligentsia, established the Mangaldai College in 1951 for the realisation of the hope of advancement of higher education. It is really very encouraging to note that the college has since its inception been growing in rapid stride and now reaches the present stage of development.

With properly planned buildings, lines of decorative plants, agricultural farm, green play-field, long wall parallel to the public road and fine gates, Mangaldai College is a charming sight to all passers-by and a lovely home for all its inmates. The canteen and the cooperative are also additions to the comfort of the employees and the students.

The importance of the Mangaldai College is beyond exaggeration. During the last fifties, it was the only higher institution of its kind in the sub-division with a large population. Even now it is the only developed college with provisions for studies both in Arts and Science. Further, this college offers facilities for sports, N.C.C. N.S.S. and farming etc.

Educational expansion in the country in post-independence era is tremendous and the vacuum in respect of higher educational institution in this vast area of Mangaldai has been filled in by this college. However, it must be admitted that the vacuum, even after the entry of Sipajhar College, Tangla College, B.T. College and many other schools,

still contains space to be filled in by the institutions of other kinds.

Mangaldai College has to lead the Sub-division towards many sided development by setting examples of hardwork for social development, offering scope for learning and producing men capable of undertaking nation-building activities.

The college was started with the meagre contributions of the people and it has passed through many financial stringencies till its inclusion in the deficit system in 1962-63. The pain of birth of a college is too much and the founding members could bear such pain because of their conviction, determination and spirit of selfless service.

The College has been offering scope for learning to the local talents belonging to income-groups of all categories. It has brought education within easy reach of even the poorest of the people. Further, due to overcrowding of admission seekers, problems of residence and financial hardships of the parents, the possibility of getting admitted in outside colleges is now decreasing. Mangaldai College is now gaining capacity to offer a solution to this growing problem.

Mangaldai College has also been producing men of abilities in the social, cultural, political and other fields. It has been sending forth alumni every year at an increasing rate. All these educated youths are serving the society within and outside the sub-division in various capacities.

The rapid growth of the High schools and the schools of other standards during the last decades even in the corners of the sub-division is largely due to the spirit of service of the products of this college. Thus, directly and also indirectly, Mangaldai College has contributed to the expansion of education.

The college-student population of the state has been increasing along with the increase in the number of colleges. In this respect too, this college has done much. It has been rendering commendable service towards the increase of college-student population in Mangaldai Sub-division.

Public institution is one of the major contributions of the modern system of education. These institutions greatly help in eliminating the old class-distinction based on hereditary system of learning and profession. Accomodating the youths belonging to different castes and creeds, Mangaldai college also has helped in creating a spirit of commonness, secularism and living-together. Further, the college has been imparting modern knowledge and ideas to the rising generations. Thus, its contribution towards a healthy and new society is very great.

Economic progress of an area largely depends upon the spread of education. Education produces men with skill for various works. The Government has, now-a-days, taken many plans for the economic developement and better health and life of the people. The execution and success of these plans demand educated man-power. The youths of this sub-division have availed themselves of the scope offered by this college to improve their qualities in order to enable them to participate in the developmental schemes. The schemes, in return, will enhance prosperity.

Education is also a way of income-distribution. Income distribution takes place through employments. The government has created employment avenues directly and indirectly. The college is sending out educated youths every year and a good number of them have been absorbed in those employments. Consequently income has been flowing to these new economic groups.

The employment of the youths in different new fields may also be described as diversion of the youths from the old economy which in our sub-division is mainly agricultural. Without such diversion to new avenues there would be heavy pressur in the old system.

The entry of the youths in clerical, technical, managerial and other fields is also a process of income equalisation. A youth belonging to a poor family may qualify himself for and

get a highly paying job. Such situations, which are not rare, result in uplifting the economy of the poor. The college, thus, contributes to the economic welfare of the people in different ways.

From the qualitative point of view, we must say, from the records of the university examinations, that the results of this college are satisfactory. We may gladly note that the students of this college have been able to secure the top positions in the university examinations. In this connection, we are to take into account the factors like malnutrition of the wards, lack of proper residential facilities and want of books and other amenities at home. These factors are to a considerable extent, responsible for the general fall of standards of education at all levels everywhere in the state. The situation has, however, shown a tendency of getting improved. The students now get some books from the college library and financial aid in the form of scholarships from the government. The hostel problem is also nearing solutions.

The celebration of the Silver Jubilee of this College is an inspiring event for the entire sub-division. It is further expected that with public cooperation and government assistance, the deficiencies of the college will be removed at the earliest and thus, the college will attain its full-fledged stage.

Mangaldai College

While writing about the Mangaldai College it will be proper to give a brief introduction about the place where the college is situated. Ancient history shows that the descendants of Silarai, the mighty brother of Maharaja Naranarayana ruled over the western part of the district of Darrang. That part has been later called Mangaldai after the name of Mangala Devi the daughter of Raja Parikshit Narayana. Thus it is seen that Mangaldai was undoubtedly the seat of the Koch Raja of Darrang. It was also the birth place of many eminent scholars like Pitambar Siddhantabagish. After the British took over the administration of Assam, Mangaldai was the Head Quarter Station of the District of Darrang for a few years. But later on when mighty Brahmaputra receded southwards the place became unhealthy and the Head Quarter Station was shifted to Tezpur. Hence the place failed to secure proper care and attention from the ruling authority in many respects. Its educational and cultural development suffered heavily. For want of a college in Mangaldai, even the meritorious students could not receive higher education for their poverty. At this juncture, the intelligentsia of Mangaldai called a meeting of the public for the establishment of a college in 1951. The meeting was held in the Mangaldai Govt. High School and the first donation of Rupees one hundred one was offered by Late Rajani Kanta Sarma of Mangaldai. This inspired the organisers to proceed with the enterprise which ultimately met with success. A strong collection

committee was formed with Shri A.B. Dasgupta, the then S.D.O. of Mangaldai as president and myself as secretary. The committee proceeded with great vigour under the guidance and kind help of Shri Dasgupta and succeeded in collecting a good amount for the college within a short time.

Thus the 20th of September, 1951 saw the birth of the Mangaldai College, the classes of which were temporarily taken up in the public library with Shri P. Sarma, M.A., B.L. as honorary Principal and Shri R. Sarmah B.L., Shri S. Dasgupta B.L., Late Bagdul Ali B.A.B.T., Shri B. Rajkhowa M.A., as honorary lecturers. A representative Governing Body was formed with Shri A.B. Dasgupta as president and myself as secretary. Shri P. Sarma, Shri S.L. Ghose, Shri S. Dasgupta, Late B.C. Medhi, Shri D.R. Dutta, Late B. Patwary, Late G. Deka, Late M.N. Goswami, Shri H. Patwary, Shri D.P. Kharghoriya, Shri A.C. Buruah, Shri T. Sarma and Shri S.R. Saharia were some amongst the Prominent members of the Governing Body, who took keen interest in the collection of fund for the college.

How the college secured affiliation from the Gauhati University is an interesting event to note. Shri Krishna Kanta Handique, the great oriental scholar, of Assam adorned the chair of the Vice-Chancellor at that time. It was in 1952 that by correspondence with the Registrar of university time was appointed to meet the Vice-Chancellor to move for affiliation of the college. The residence of the V.C. at that time was the old bungalow of the Principal of the Cotton College. Late B. Ahmed B.L., Shri B. Rajkhowa and myself were deputed by G.B. to move the Vice-Chancellor for the affiliation. The V.C. granted the interview at 9.30 A.M. and we were called in. We met him in the portico of the bungalow. He received us with sympathy, kindness and encouraged us saying that 'Mangaldai is a suitable place for collegiate education as it is far from the noise and bustle of the city'. He assured us that he would send the Inspector to visit the

place and submit a report on the proposal for establishing a college at Mangaldai. Within a short time Shri A.K. Bar-Kakatee was sent for the purpose. He visited the place and submitted a report recommending the establishment of a college at Mangaldai at Upahupara in the site where the college is situated at present on 50 bighas of land. He personally visited the site with Late B.C. Baruah, Shri S.L. Ghose and R. Sarma and selected this site which was primarily suggested by Shri A.B. Dasgupta. Later on Shri B.K. Bhuya, the succeeding S.D.O. finally settled the land with the college. Shri J.N. Das, who was S.D.O. of Mangaldai for a short period did much for the college by collecting funds. It was during the time of Late K.K. Phukan as S.D.O. of Mangaldai that the first building of the college was constructed. Shri B.N. Das and Shri S. Sarkar who worked as S.D.O. of Mangaldai, in succession for sometime took great interest in the collection of funds for the college. In this connection the name of Shri B.N. Das munsiff Magistrate and Shri R. Bora Magistrate are to be remembered with gratitude for their sincere work for the college.

After 1952 when the wholetime regular lecturers were appointed a great financial crisis came upon the college and the secretary with some of the members of the governing body and the teaching staff had to run from place to place in connection of funds to meet the monthly expenditure of the college. Shri G.N. Thakuria, M.A. worked much for the development of the college in these difficult times.

Thus passing through a period of great stress and strain the college at last succeeded in receiving grants from the Govt. especially when Late B.P. Chaliha, a great lover of learning became the Chief Minister of Assam.

At this stage it should be mentioned that when the time for starting the three years degree course came Shri Sandhi Ram Saharia B.L. one of the organisers of the college lent a sum of Rs. 5000.00 as an advance against collection to make

up the shortage in the reserve fund which was to be deposited before starting the degree course. This amount however was repaid in full out of the collected amount subsequently.

In due course the college has grown up and by the grace of The Almighty and the good will of the people, in general, it has succeeded in becoming a full fledged institution with U.G.C. and deficit grants with classes both the Pass and Honours courses.

After the retirement of Shri P. Sarma M.A., B.L. who served the institution from 1951 to 1960 as honorary and from 1960 to 1966 as whole time Principal, Shri P.C. Goswami M.A.B.T. has been appointed as Principal of the college and by his sincere efforts the college has developed substantially. The college at present has become a hermitage of learning with excellent flowering groves in the vast precincts of the college situated by the side of the Trunk Road from Gauhati to Tezpur. Thus the prediction of Shri K.K. Handique seems to be fulfilled.

May God bless the College.

As I Look Back

In 1950 I was a student of the Cotton College at Gauhati. In 1951 I became a student of the Mangaldai Arts College. This happened in the following way. After the annual examination I was promoted to the Second Year class and then I fell ill. I was bed-ridden for some time and could not attend the classes. I went home to recoup my health. Misfortune does not come alone. To my great disappointment I found another patient at our home. My younger brother was lying seriously ill. He was bed-ridden. But no body could imagine that it was his death-bed. He passed away within few days. There was gloom every where. The attention of my parents fell on me, on my health, on my future. Father became stoic. But I became cynical. I told my parents that I would not further study, as I began to think that study was meaningless. There was a pause before the family.

In 1951 a College at Mangaldai made a humble beginning, thanks to the untiring efforts of the members of the Mangaldai Bar and the keen interest taken by the then Sub-Divisional Officer Sri A.B. Dasgupta. In the face of persistent demands of my father, mother and elder brother I gave in and my name was enrolled as a student. In this way I became a student of the Mangaldai Arts College—initially that was the name of the College, and incidentally I belonged to the first batch of students.

The beginning of the College was no better than the beginning of any venture High School. There were about sixty students. Classes were held at the Public Library in the evening, in the light of petromax. There was no electricity at that time at Mangaldai. The Town was electrified around 1960. Later, classes were held at the Town L.P. School and the College office was accommodated at the Public Library. Later, classes were held at the Town Girls' High School. Thereafter, the Director of Public Instructions was kind enough to make the Boys' High School building available for us. This arrangement continued for a long time. I do not know in which year the College was shifted to its own building.

At the beginning there were few M.A.'s to teach us anything. Late Dharma Nath Shastri, Late Mlvi Bakdul Ali and Sri Bhabananda Rajkhowa of Mangaldai Boys' High School taught us Sanskrit, History and Assamese respectively. (I was their student in that High School till 1950). Principal Sri Purandar Sarma taught us Economics. Advocate Sri Rameswar Sarma taught us Civics. At that time the subject of Civics was taught in the Intermediate Course. It contained two parts—(1) Elements of Economics and (2) Civics. Advocate Sri Satyesh Dasgupta taught us English. By 1952 the teaching staff were a "College look." Sri Sadasiv Chakravarty, M.A. (Sanskrit), Sri Harakanta Mahanta, M.A. (Philosophy), Sri Karuna Kanta Sarma, M.A. (Economics), Sri Hriday Ranjan Das M.A. (English) and Sri Gajendra Thakuria M.A. (History) joined the teaching staff and we got duly qualified teachers (as per University rules) for each subject. Sri Das was regarded as a prize possession from the Darrang College, Tezpur. I do not know what lured him to Mangaldai College. At that time Darrang College was the only College for a vast area from North Lakhimpur to Mangaldai. That was a time when there was a great dearth of M.A.'s. In those days as soon as a student passed his M.A.,

he was offered a teachership in a Private College, no matter whether or not he was suited to the teaching profession. Later, stage by stage, but not in our studentship, as if the College were going to be disbanded, these good teachers—(I have omitted to use the word Professor, pursuant to a Government notification recently published)—left the College. Sri Rajkhowa was a Govt. School teacher and a part time lecturer in Assamese. He gave up the part-time post. Sri Chakravarty left for Pragjyotish College, Gauhati, Sri Sarma left for, perhaps, Nalbari College. Sri Thakuriah left the College to be the Principal of a newly started College at Mirza, West of Gauhati. Sri Mahanta left for Dergaon in the District of Sibsagar and became the founder Principal of Dergaon Kamal Dowerah College. Unfortunately he died a premature death this year. I do not know where Sri Das went.

There were about 60 students to begin with. There were few regular students, mostly irregulars who renewed their study after a long gap. In the very year of inception, the students formed a Union Society. Sri Haren Sarma became the Union Secretary. Sri Mahibul Hoque became the Sports Secretary. I became the Cultural Secretary. We held a music social and the whole Town turned up to witness the fare served out by the College Students. The President of the Governing Body of the College was the Sub-Divisional Officer Sri Jitendra Nath Das. He is at present the Vice-Chancellor of the Dibrugarh University. He was the Chief Guest of our Union function. The Music Social almost became a variety show. I remember, the trial scene in the Merchant of Venice was acted by a batch of students in which Sri Dina Deka in the role of Shylock outshone others. Sri Deka was a talented person in many ways. I do not know why he gave up his studies.

Per chance a few of us came into close contact and formed a coterie. We occasionally met at the lodging of

Uday Chandra Das. He was an employee in the Office of the Deputy Inspector of Schools. He availed of the opportunity offered by the new College as the classes were held in the evening. We memorised some songs from gramophone records and sang them, (blurred out, to be precise). Sri Das imitated the Tabla on the table and occasionally he would applaud us by saying that our tune was in perfect harmony with the rhythm of his Tabla. But when he became engrossed in his Tabla we sometimes forgot some words of the songs. So we would stop singing and begin to recollect the exact words in the composition of the songs. Das would be infuriated and would rebuke us by saying that we had not ear for music. As I look back, I now realise that these were innocent funs, frivolities and pranks which helped us in conquering our frustrated feelings.

I also remember, The First All Assam Inter College Foot-ball Tournament was held in 1952 at Jorhat. We went there with a challenging spirit. I do not remember the names of all the players of our team. I remember only the following :—Ahok Deka, Phani Deka, another Deka, Kabi Saikia, Mahibul Hoque, Nagen Chaudhury and one Anwar Hussain. Our first match was against Nowgong College. We won the match (4-3). Next we played against Darrang College. We won that match too (3-0). Darrang College was definitely better than us. It was a rainy season. Except one or two, we played bare-footed. For some time we could not do anything. Sometimes Dame Luck swings her favour to a particular side. Had there been no luck, we would have collapsed against mounting pressures of the Darrang College. Against the run of play, the ball came to my possession once. I made a feeble shot at the opponents' goal. The custodian caught hold of it. But as the ball was slippery, he could not hold it fast and to his utter wretchedness, it crossed the goal-line. I scored the only goal of my life in a major fixture. Our next big match proved to be a misadventure on our part.

We had to line up against the formidable Assam Medical College, Dibrugarh. We realised the power possessed and displayed by them in their other engagements. From the beginning, we were over-awed. The Medicos consisted of a member of reputed players who, at different times, represented the State in the Santosh Trophy. The Medicos and ourselves were accommodated in one Hall of the J.B. College. So we came to know them closely. I remember the names of the following players amongst them—(They are now doctors)—Dr. Prasanna Goswami, Dr. S. Dasgupta, Dr. Sarat Datta, Dr. Samin Kalita, Dr. Lyngdoh and Dr. Kerketta. Out of them Dr. Deka captained the State team once. In our joys against them we scored first through P. Deka. Soon our joys turned into sadness. Our Goal-Keeper Ashok Deka who gave a good account of himself in the two previous engagements, suddenly lost his form. He could not intercept any shot, strong or weak, angular or volley, long range or short range. Some goals were scored against us in quick succession. In the other end Dasgupta became unbeatable. We got demoralised. In the end we were knocked out with a good drubbing (8-1).

The fund position of the College was not sound. The students moved about with the authorities to collect donations in the weekly markets. I went out only once. The authorities were hard-pressed to keep the Institution alive.

I remember that the then Governor of Assam Sri Joy Ram Das Daulat Ram paid a visit to Mangaldai and we offered him an address of welcome.

Hours and days rolled by, then the months and then the two academic years. I now do not remember how many students appeared in the Intermediate of Arts examination. Twelve students came out successful. Uday Das, Benu Sarma and myself secured First Division. Dineswar Kalita secured Second Division. Perhaps Haren Sarma and Tapeswar Sarma secured the same division.

After 25 years I am writing these things from memory. I did not keep any diary. So the readers will please excuse me if I have misquoted any information. I thank Sri Jiban Sarma for giving me this opportunity to write some thing for inclusion in the Souvenir. I have been converted to the way of thinking of Sri M.C. Chagla after reading his autobiography, *Roses in December*. I am beginning to realise that the expression, 'self-made man' is a misnomer. Success or failure of a man depends upon certain "contingencies" over which he has no control. The starting of a College at Mangaldai in 1951 was a similar contingency that moulded my career. I rejoice at the idea that the persons who sacrificed much for the growth of the College, have lived to this day to see its Silver Jubilee being celebrated. I offer my gratitude to the honourable members of the Mangaldai Bar who led the way.

Mangaldai College its' Growth and Development

Independence of India in 1947, emerged with new hopes and aspirations to the people, for the fulfilment of needs they felt for over decades and such an enthusing air stirred the people of Mangaldai Sub-division to rise to the occasion. The lack of Collegiate institution in the Sub-division and the financial inabilities of the people for sending their wards outside for higher education, drew the first attention of its civilians towards the establishment of a College here.

The initiative for this noble cause was taken by some enlightened gentlemen mostly the members of the Mangaldai Bar and the then S.D.O. (Civil) of Mangaldai Sub-division.

The first public meeting for the establishment of a College at Mangaldai was held on 25th June 1951, under the Presidentship of Shri A.B. Dasgupta I.A.S., the then S.D.O. (Civil) of Mangaldai Sub-division. The meeting decided to start an Intermediate Arts College at Mangaldai with effect from the ensuing session and a steering committee was formed with Shri A.B. Dasgupta, Late B.C. Medhi M.L.A., Shri P. Sarma, M.L.A., Late B. Ahmed B.L., Shri R. Sarma B.L. and Shri B.N. Rajkhowa M.A. as members. The meeting also decided to hold another public meeting and Sri R. Sarma B.L. was entrusted with the task of convening the meeting. The first donation of Rs. 101.00 was generously offered in the first meeting, by Late Rajani Kanta Sarma, to meet the initial expenses of the College.

The second public meeting was held on 14th July, 1951, under the presidentship of Shri A.B. Dasgupta. The meeting endorsed the resolution of the first public meeting and decided to establish an Intermediate Arts College at Mangaldai. A Governing Body was formed with Shri A.B. Dasgupta as president and Shri R. Sarma B.L. (advocate) as secretary. A fund-collection committee was formed with almost all the civil servants and the selected public leaders of the locality.

An emergent meeting of the Governing Body held on 25.7.51 entrusted Late B.C. Medhi M.L.A., and Shri S. Saharia B.L. (Advocate) to contact the Gauhati University authorities for ascertaining the requisite conditions to start the College. Subsequently when the requisite conditions were known, the Governing Body decided to start the Mangaldai Intermediate Arts College introducing the subjects namely, English, Vernacular, History, Civics, Logic and Sanskrit. The post of the Principal as well as of the concerning lecturers were advertised in the Assam Tribune, Statesman and Amrit Bazar Patrika. In the mean time the Governing Body appointed Shri Purandar Sarma M.A., B.L., M.L.A., as Honorary Principal of the College and Shri Jiban Chandra Sarma as a part time Office Assistant. The admission of students started from 10.9.51. Shri Rameswar Sarma B.L. (Advocate) and Shri Satyesh Dasgupta B.L. (Advocate) volunteered to take up classes without remuneration and also Late Bakdul Ali B.A.B.T., Shri Bhabananda Rajkhowa M.A., Shri Sachindra Mohan Bose B.A. and Late Dharmanath Shastri joined the College as part time lecturers. The classes were started from 20.9.51 in the Mangaldai Public Library. Thus the dream of opening a College at Mangaldai was materialised, fulfilling a long felt public need.

In the later part of the same year, Shri Sadasiv Chakravorty M.A., and late Harakanta Mahanta M.A.B.L., joined the College as whole time lecturers. In the following year Shri Karuna Kanta Sarma M.A., Shri Hriday Ranjan Das M.A., and Shri Gajen Thakuria M.A. also joined the College as lec-

turers. During the formative period of the college, these dedicated teachers over and above, their teaching work, used to organise fund collection drives and supervise construction works.

In July 1952, the founder President of the Governing Body Shri A.B. Dasgupta was transferred and Shri Jitendra Nath Das (Present Vice-Chancellor of Dibrugarh University) joined as S.D.O. (Civil), Mangaldai and was kind enough to act as President of the Governing Body. Shri Hriday Ranjan Das M.A., was appointed Vice-Principal in the same year. From September, 1952 a regular office of the College was started at Mangaldai Public Library and appointed Shri Mahsin Ali, as whole time Office Assistant.

The present site of the College was finally selected on 2.3.53. The Governing Body sent a delegation to wait upon the Chief Minister, Finance Minister and Education Minister of Assam, for suitable recurring grants for the College. Shri J.C. Das the then S.D.O. and President of the Governing Body was transferred in March 1953. The succeeding S.D.O.s continued to render help for the development of the College. The results of the first batch of I.A. candidates from Mangaldai College were very encouraging. Twelve students passed the Examination ; three out of them secured first division.

In a public meeting held on 28.7.53, the name of the College was changed from Mangaldai Intermediate Arts College to Mangaldai College and resolved to up grade the College upto degree standard. But the resolution of starting degree classes could not be materialised till 1959, for want of sufficient funds.

Building Construction :

Construction of buildings at its present site started in 1955 with the clearing of dense ghost-haunted jungles of Upahupara Village Reserve at a cost of rupees three thousand. Shri Sunanda Ram Deka was given the contract of the College

building to be completed at a cost of Rs. 12,160.00 within 3 months. Late Padmananda Goswami was entrusted to supervise the construction works. The building was completed in the scheduled time.

College Shifted :

On the first of March 1956, the college was shifted from Public Library to its own building. In the same year a Boys' Hostel was also constructed at the cost of Rs. 10,668.00. The Night Shift classes were started in the year 1957. The college gratefully remembers the services of those lecturers who volunteered to teach students without remuneration, at the initial stage.

In January 1958, Shri G.N. Thakuria was appointed Vice-Principal as Shri H.R. Das resigned from Mangaldai College. From the same year the college used to get recurring grants-in-aid from the Government of Assam and it amounted to Rs. 1,000/- per month. The degree classes were started in the year 1959.

College granted affiliation :

Mangaldai College was granted affiliation to the University of Gauhati in the year 1960. Shri R. Natarajan the then S.D.O. (Civil), Mangaldai was pleased to offer a financial help amounting to Rs. 2720.00 in March 1960 for the expansion of the college building. He collected the amount from various sources at his own initiative. By and by the Government of Assam also granted Rs. 20,000.00 for general improvement purposes. In the same year, Shri Sandhi Ram Saharia B.L. (Advocate) lended a sizeable amount to the college to meet some urgent needs. His generosity will be remembered by the college, for all time to come.

Whole time Principal :

Shri P. Sarma M.A., B.L., who had been working as Honorary Principal since the inception of the college, was

appointed whole-time principal on 19.11.1960. After taking over charges as full time Principal, Shri P. Sarma, devoted himself to solve the existing problems of the college. In 1961, the first batch of B.A. students appeared in final examination and five students came out successful. In 1962, 'Mangaldai College Planning Forum' and 'Students' Aid Fund' were constituted under the able guidance of Principal P. Sarma.

College under Deficit Grants-in-aid :

Mangaldai College was taken under Deficit Grants-in-aid by Assam Government in 1962-63. It also received a Govt. non-recurring grant of Rs. 20,000.00, for development purposes.

Honours courses opened :

Honours courses were opened in Political Science, History, Assamese and English in 1965-66 and in Economics and Geography respectively in 1966-67 and 1972-73.

U.G.C. Grant :

In September 1965, the college for the first time received a grant of Rs. 8,596.64, being U.G.C.'s share of assistance for the session 1964-65, for introducing Three Years Degree Courses.

Science introduced :

Science courses were introduced in the college at P.U. level in 1966-67 and at degree course in 1968-69.

Founder Principal retired :

The founder Principal Shri P. Sarma M.A., B.L., who gave a dynamic shape to the college during its first one and half decades, retired on 12.9.66 and our present Principal Shri P. Goswami M.A., B.T. joined the college on the same

date. Later Shri A. Mazid M.A., Head of the Political Science department who served in the college since 1956, was made Vice-Principal, as the enrolment requirement of 500 students could be satisfied in 1966-67.

Girls' Hostel :

A beautiful girls' hostel was constructed at the cost of Rs. 1,61,977.00 in 1969 and opened to accommodate boarders in 1970. This has partially solved the accommodation problem for female students hailing from distant places.

In the same year, a college canteen was also started in the college campus by the college employees on a Co-operative basis. This has solved the long standing difficulties of refreshment of the students and employees of Mangaldai College

I.C. Foot-ball Tournament :

1972 is a very significant year for the college. It hosted in the year, the Gauhati University Inter College Foot-ball Tournament. As many as 34 colleges from eastern states namely, Assam, Meghalaya, Manipur and Arunachal Pradesh, participated in the tournament.

The Reception Committee after meeting all the expenses of the Tournament, saved a sizeable amount and constructed a "Preksha Prakostha" (open Air Theatre) with a plinth area of 1296 square feet and constructed at the cost of Rs. 17,500.00 (Rupees seventeen thousand five hundred only). It is a solitary instance of saving in the annals of G.U. Inter College Football Tournament and of constructing a permanent structure.

New Building added :

Quite a few number of class rooms including a spacious Professors Common Room, Administrative Unit, Science Laboratories, Girls' Common Room and Principal's quarters

were constructed with in the period 1967 to 1973-74. Now the college library is provided with a library room, three reading rooms and a room for the Librarian. A Boys' common room and a room for the Students' Union have also been provided.

The present floor area of the college building including Boys' Hostel, Girls' Hostel, Administrative and Teaching Blocks and Principals Quarters is 40,888 square feet and floor area of other buildings including Earner-Learner residence, Residence of farm incharge, Granary, farm's office building and Chowkidar's house, cowshed, college canteen, college co-operative store, Post office and Chowkidar shed is 3,528 square feet. Thus the total floor area in college campus comes upto 5,89,284 square feet. The total value of the college buildings has been estimated at around rupees seven lakhs. In constructing the buildings the executive engineers of Mangaldai P.W.D. (R&B) *viz.*, N. Rahman, S. Talukdar, M. Chakravarty, G. Das, B. Sarma and Mina Hazarika (Over seer) helped us in many ways.

Big Donors and Karim Bux Toran :

Late Phani Bhusan Bose, former Head clerk of Barangajuli Tea Estate of Mangaldai Sub-division, Late Karim Bux of Mangaldai town, Shri Bhogi Ram Deka Mauzader, Bhergaon, and Shri Kalimuddin Ahmed, a flourishing businessman of Mangaldai town are the big donors of Mangaldai College who donated to the college, more than rupees one thousand. They will be remembered by the college society, for their sacrifice in the formative period of the college.

The present main gate of the college, the 'Karim Bux Toran' was erected with the generous donation of Shri Kalimuddin Ahmed, in memory of his father, Late Karim Bux. This may be mentioned that after the liquidation of Mangaldai town Co-operatives, the share-holders donated their sharemoney amounting to around four thousand to the college.

N.E.I.G.S. Session :

The college had the privilege to host the Fifth Annual Session of the North East India Geographical Society in 1976. The session was inaugurated by Dr. H.K. Barua, Vice-Chancellor of Gauhati University and was attended by 120 geographers from Assam, Meghalaya, Manipur, Nagaland, Arunachal Pradesh, Bihar and Rajasthan. Shri Upen Das, Minister for Fisheries, Government of Assam, opened the Geographical Exhibition which was highly appreciated by the visitors including Dr. N.L. Gupta of Udaipur University and Dr. I. Sinha of Patna University.

OTHER FEATURES OF THE COLLEGE.**National Cadet Corps :**

A Sub-unit of National Cadet Corps was introduced in Mangaldai College in 1958 and Shri A. Mazid M.A. was its first Lt. Commander. It is now under the 6th Assam N.C.C. Battalion, Barpeta. At present this unit has 100 cadets under the captainship of Shri D.C. Nandi M.A., L.L.B.

National Service Scheme :

In 1972, The National Service Scheme was introduced in this college. It trains the cadets for social services. It is gratifying to note that Shri Indra Kanta Koch, one of the NSS cadets of Mangaldai college was adjudged the best cadet of Assam and by virtue of this he got an opportunity to visit Japan in 1976. Shri Rajendra Barua M.A.B.T. is the incharge of NSS unit of Mangaldai College.

Planning Forum :

With a view to popularising the planning activities of the Government of India and to create an environment of research, the Mangaldai College Planning Forum was formed

in 1962. Beside holding seminars organising discussions and debates on the national problems, it successfully conducted three socio-economic sample surveys and published two volumes containing the findings of the surveys. Shri Sarat Ch. Sarma, M.A.B.T., is the incharge of the forum.

College Canteen :

In view of the refreshment difficulties, the employees of Mangaldai College took the initiative to start a College Canteen on a co-operative basis within the college campus in July 1970. Now it has its own building and four employees including one manager. Over and above catering facilities, the canteen also under took the responsibility of supplying stationery goods and books required by students and the college administration. It's present share capital is Rs. 6880.00 only. Sri A. Mazid M.A., Vice-Principal is the Chairman of the canteen committee. Shri Kumud Chandra Handique M.A. was it's founder secretary and after him Shri Sarat Chandra Sarma M.A.B.T., worked as secretary. Shri Debesh Chandra Nandi M.A., LL.B. is its present secretary.

Vocational Guidance Cell :

To guide the students for various competitive examinations, Mangaldai College has a vocational Guidance Cell in view of the fact that the students from rural oriented colleges like ours find it difficult to secure good positions in various competitive examinations. Last year, three cash prizes were awarded to the best three general knowledge competitors at the rate of Rs. 50.00, Rs. 30.00 and Rs. 20.00 each as special incentive. An Advisory Board conducts the cell. Shri Sarat Ch. Sarma M.A.B.T. and Shri Hiren Goswami M.A. are the joint convenors of the cell.

Physics workshop :

A workshop has been established in the department of physics in 1973. An electric grinder machine and a drilling

machine along with other minor equipments have been procured. All repairing works of the science departments are undertaken in this workshop. Further there is a plan to expand it in future and to train selected and interested students in some technical trade in it. Mrs. Deepali Neog M.Sc., Head of the department of physics is its Adviser and Shri Khalilur-Rhaman M.Sc., is now the Prof. incharge of the workshop. It is worthwhile to mention that at its earlier period, Shri Bhupen Kakati M.Sc., took some initiatives for its establishment.

Sahitya Chora :

'Sahitya Chora' a literary circle of Mangaldai College, affiliated to the Assam Sahitya Sabha, was established in 1970. Shri Basanta Goswami M.A. was its founder Secretary. After him Shri Prabhat Ch. Sarma M.A. worked as Secretary till 1975. Shri Jiban Ch. Sarma M.A., is the present Secretary of the Sahitya Chora.

Agricultural Farm :

In 1969, an agricultural farm in the college was started with a view to using the unutilised lands of the college and giving part time employment opportunities to some students, so that they may earn and learn at the same time. Shri Dandi Ram Dutta, former President, Mandaldai College Governing Body and an ex-Minister of the Government of Assam, took keen interest for the development of the farm and offered financial grants. Late Jana Ram Kalita, a progressive cultivator made a happy beginning. There is a hostel for the earner-learners where forty five students are accommodated and benefited from the scheme. Shri Rajendra Nath Brua M.A., B.T. is the teacher incharge and Shri Narendra Kumar Singh M.Sc. is the Superintendent of the farm. Shri Nagendra Nath Sarma M.A. M. PHIL, was its founder teacher incharge.

Consumers' Co-operative Society :

To cater the needs of the college employees and students a Consumers' Co-operative Society was established in 1974. It supplies groceries and stationeries. It has 1820 share holders of which 1,750 and 70 are students and employees respectively. Shri Lokeswar Nath M.Sc., B.T. was its founder Secretary and Shri Jagannath Sarma M.A. B.Sc. B.T. is its present secretary. In opening the co-operative we get sufficient help from Shri Golok Dutta Asstt. Co-operative sub registrar Mangaldai.

Employees' Thrift and Credit Society Ltd. :

An employee's thrift and credit society was established in Mangaldai College in 1966. At present its working capital stands at Rs. 73,340.00. Total 70 share holders contribute to the fund at the rate of Rs. 20.00 per month. It provides loan upto Rs. 1800.00 to a share holder at a time. There are emergency provisions of loan also. Shri Dipti Prasad Barua M.A. (Duble) was its founder Secretary who was succeeded by Shri Lokeswar Nath M.Sc. B.T. Present Secretary of the fund is Shri Girish Chandra Goswami M.Sc. B.T.

Post Office :

The P & T department operated a sub-post office in the college campus. The college provided a room to the said department at a free of cost.

College Library :

Although for maturity of a library requires ten decades, yet during the last quarter century the college library is heading towards maturity. It is providing separate reading room facilities to boys, girls and teachers of the college. There are 15,759 books at the cost of Rs. 1,30,365.00. It subscribes

thirteen magazines and seven news papers. Moreover, it receives publications from central and state governments at free of cost.

Since 1968, the college has been helping students under a special Book Aid Scheme. According to the scheme, all Honours students, all B. Sc. students and all First Division students in P.U. class, get all the books they require for two years till the completion of their course of study. Other each student gets at least a book from the library.

Recently a Book Bank is donated by the United Commercial Bank for the use of Economics Honours students. The college is grateful to the bank management and particularly to Dr. Upendra Nath Bardaloi, one of the Director of the Board of Directors and to Shri Girish Goswami, Branch Manager, Mangaldai Branch of United Commercial Bank. Shri J.A.M. Iqbal B.Sc. B. LIB. Sc. is its librarian.

Hostels :

There are three hostels in the college one for the boys, one for the girls and a third one for the earner-learners of the farm.

The Boy's hostel started in 1956. Now there are 57 boarders. Shri G.C. Goswami M. Sc. B.T. was its first superintendent and presently Shri K. Koch M.A.B.T. is managing the affairs of the hostel as Superintendent.

The well planned Girls' Hostel came into being in 1969 and was opened for boarders in 1970. Now 44 girls' students has been accommodated here. Mrs. Suchitra Barua M.A. LLB. was its first Hostel Superintendent and present Superintendent is Miss Naharun Nisha M.A.

The earner-learner hostel also accommodates eight students.

Laboratories :

There are five well equipped laboratories for Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Biology and Geography. These are hummed with activities through out the whole day.

College Campus :

Mangaldai College campus, deserves special mention in history of the college. The campus with 152 bighas of land, has been fastly changing its colour. Before the establishment of the college, it was a happy home of tigers and reptiles ; which at the magic touch of human endeavour has transformed into a place of panoramic enchanting site, which cannot be expressed but felt.

Lines of beautiful growing gold mohar, Peltiferum, silver oak, Orcaria, Mesua ferrea, Polyalthia longifolia, Peacock flower and one hundred five coconut trees, remind one to an ancient hermitage. Twenty nine kinds of flower trees and thirty nine kinds of other trees have been planted here in a plan way.

Beautiful college buildings, play field, busy laboratories, canteen, co-operative stores and agricultural farm leave a lasting impression even on a casual visitor.

The college received much help from the student social servicers and N.S.S. unit for levelling the field and cutting drainages of the campus. For Planning and beautification of it the college must express gratefulness to Shri Pramod Ch. Goswami M.Sc. Director of Soil Conservation, Shri Dandi Ram Dutta, Ex-State minister of Assam, Shri Surendra Nath Deka M.Sc., Shri Ranti Dev Sarma Barua, Shri Jatin Nath, Shri Pani Ram Das, Shri Upen Sahariah, Arun Baruah, Sri Kamal Singh, Shri Phanin Nath, Shri Gauri Deka M.A., Shri Dehi Ram Barua, Shri Arun Barua, Shri Mafizuddin Ahmed, Late Ibrahim Ali and Shri Samiruddin Choudhury, for their kind help and co-operation.

And Miles To Go.

No doubt the establishment of a full fledged college at a place like Mangaldai is not an easy affair. Whatever we have achieved so far in this respect is commendable and

also the result of untiring efforts of the people of Mangaldai for long twenty five years. Many people, known and unknown, have been extending their generous donations for the growth of this institution.

The institution having been started with sixty students twenty five years back, has 1750 on its roll at present to be guided by 50 teachers both in Arts and Science group. Nevertheless, there should not be an air of complacency with all its achievements attained so far. There is an urgent need for opening new subjects like Zoology, Geology, Hindi, Arabic and commerce and also to introduce Honours in Science subjects and in some Arts subjects like Education, Mathematics and English. We need a Boys' hostel to accommodate at least 100 students and an Auditorium with all modern amenities.

With the rapid growth of number of students year after year inadequacy of class rooms is urgently felt. Over and above these, spacious rooms for accommodating offices of planning forum, N.S.S., N.C.C. and quarters for hostel Superintendents and teachers are along felt necessities. Let us hope that the co-operation and sympathy of the people in general and Govt. in particular will pave the way for making this institution an ideal and full-fledged one. May God help us in our noble venture.

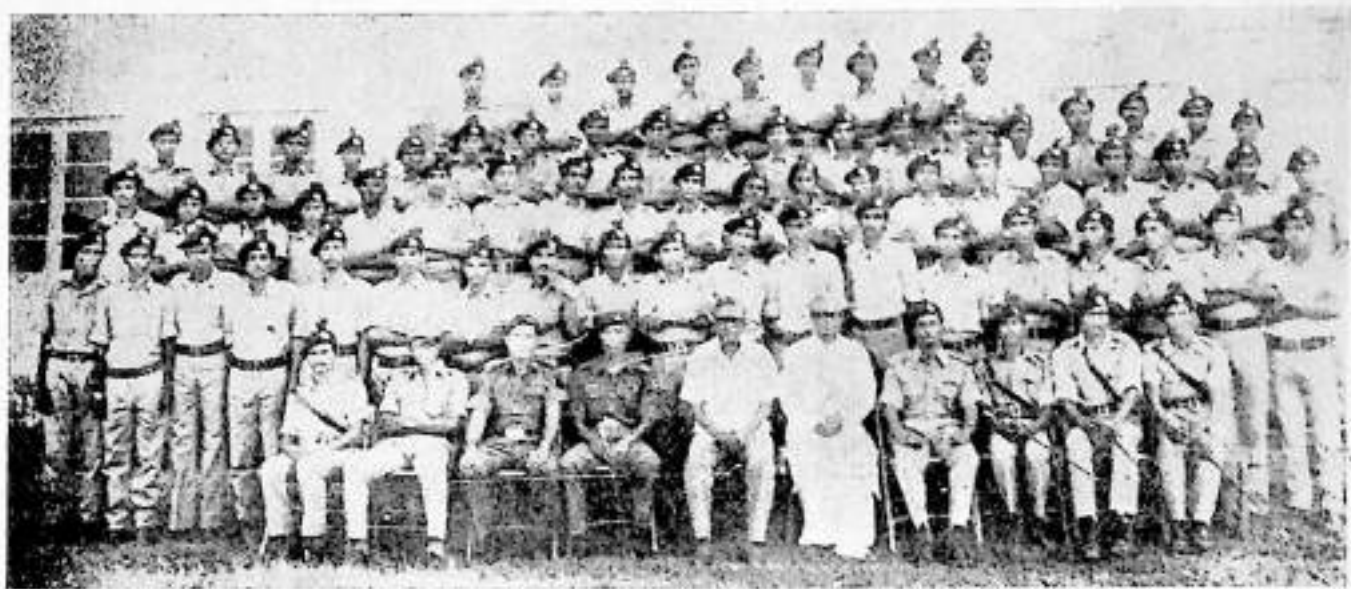

National Cadet Corps in Mangaldai College

The Government of India introduced the National Cadet Corps (N.C.C.) Scheme in 1948 with the aims (1) to develop character, comradeship, the ideal of service and capacity for leadership in young men and women ; (2) to provide service training to young men and women so as to stimulate interests in the defence of the country ; (3) and to build up a reserve of man power to enable the armed forces to expand rapidly in a national emergency. Henceforth N.C.C. training was started in some important educational institutions in the country. Mangaldai College also had the opportunity of having a sub-unit of a Platoon strength under the 1st Assam Bn. N.C.C., Gauhati, in 1958. Prof. A. Mazid, the present Vice-Principal of the college, was commissioned as the Commander of the college sub-unit. Since then N.C.C. cadets of the college are having an unbroken good record.

After the Chinese aggression in 1962 the Government of India felt the necessity of augmenting the reserve of trained man-power to meet any emergency. So in 1963 N.C.C. training was made compulsory for all male students of colleges and universities and a new branch of N.C.C. under the name N.C.C.R. (Rifles) was introduced. Company strength was made 200 and each college was allowed to raise several companies according to its enrolment. In our college also a second coy was raised in 1963 and I was commissioned to command it. From 1963 to 1968 our N.C.C. Coys were

under the 13th Assam Bn. N.C.C., Nalbari. Thereafter the Coy strength was reduced to 100 and the compulsory scheme was abandoned. Lt. A. Mazid resigned from N.C.C. and the single Coy that remained under my command was placed under the 6th Assam Bn. N.C.C. Barpeta.

Our cadets have always displayed a high sense of discipline and keenness in receiving the training. In the Unit and Inter-unit Annual Training Camps our cadets made their presence felt not only with their performance in the field but also with their activities in games, cultural functions and social services. During the emergencies in 1965 and 1971 our cadets voluntarily came forward to help the local authorities and took part in Night Patrolling and guarding the strategic points of the town. In important local festivals they help the local authorities in maintaining peace.

Every year some of our cadets (as vacancies allowed) take part in different All India Camps, such as Advance Training Course, Mountaineering Course, Army Attachment Course, etc.

Many of our ex-cadets have got employment in different departments of the State and Central Governments. The N.C.C. training they received in the college has placed them in good stead everywhere.

In a fast developing college like ours there has always been dearth of class-rooms and so the college authorities have so long failed to make accommodation for the N.C.C. stores in the college campus. This year a small room has been allowed for N.C.C. stores, but a strong-room for arms is still awaited. This puts us to much difficulty in following the training programme. We have a short range in the college campus constructed in 1963, but practice firing is not regularly held as the unit does not provide for it. Very irregular holding of Certificate Examination debars, many promising cadets from having a good career. The authorities concerned have been moved and it is hoped that in near future

these difficulties will be overcome.

The Unit Headquarter is about 120 Km from this college. So it has become difficult to keep close contact with the Unit and hence much of inconvenience have been experienced in conducting this Sub-unit. If the Unit authorities are a bit more helpful and co-operative, this Sub-unit will, I am sure, earn reputation not only for this college but for the state as a whole.

**'Agriculture Bias Scheme' and 'Earner-Learner
Scheme' of Mangaldai College Agricultural
Farm Established, 1969**

Short History :

Mangaldai College Agricultural Farm was started in December, 1969. The Farm was established by Jana Kalita, a working agriculturist. Shri Nagen Sarma M.A took interest in it. Sri Kalita started to cultivate at his own cost and he kept 2 college students in the farm for his assistance. Unfortunately, Jana Kalita died on 26.9.71. The plans and programmes of the farm remained half-done. Then the earner-learner scheme was accepted and some poor meritorious students were allowed to live in the farm as 'Earner-Learners'. Uptill now, this system is being continued.

The Earner-Learner Scheme :

According to this scheme, the college students will 'earn' in the farm and will 'learn' in college.

- i) Free accommodation with some other provided to 10 poor and meritorius students. They will live in the farm and will maintain a simple life.
- ii) As per instruction of the Farm Superintendent, the Earner-learners will offer voluntary services in the farm for 10 hours minimum in a week for the alround development of the farm.
- iii) The students will utilise some land for cultivation of their own and their earnings will be utilised by themselves for their own expenses of study. Accounts of their earnings are to be recorded.
- iv) On the basis of the progress of works, students are generally allowed to stay in the Farm for 2 years.

- v) The earner-learners are to take care of the whole farm, mainly the fencing, seasonal crops and the fruits garden.
- iv) Seperate accounts for Farm earnings and expenditure have been maintained by college authority.
- vii) Experts on agriculture visit the farm and offer valuable suggestions and demonstrations on high yielding crops.
- viii) Besides the earner-learners, the National Service Corps (N.S.C.) cadets also work in the farm for work-experience.
- ix) According to "Agriculture Bias Scheme", all students are allowed to take part in Agriculture. The science students take part in their respective subjects. This scheme is likely to be supplemented with the introduction of a new subject.—'Agriculture' in Degree classes.
- x) The following benefits in general are obtained from the farm :
 - (a) It helps in college discipline. (b) Tendency to minimise the mess dues. (c) Accounts keeping and practice of sale. (d) Attraction of the students for Agriculture. (e) Use of Advanced Agriculture Methods. (f) Close relationship with the Department of Agricultures and Block Development office for Rural Reconstruction.
- xi) Special benefit from the farm :
 - a) Sri Indra Kanta Koch, an earner-learner student of the farm for 2 years (1972-73 and 1973-74) passed B.Sc. with distinction. He joined the "9th Japanese Youth Good-will Cruise Programme." and visited Japan, Sri Lanka and Burmah with other youths of India.
 - b) Sri Mati Ram Medhi, an earner-learner of the farm (1972-73) passed B.A. with Honours in Geography securing First Class First position from Gauhati University.

- c) As many as 45 students have been benefitted from the farm directly living in the farm from 1970-71 to 1976-77. Out of them, 10 have got graduation, 11 have passed P.U. till now and 8 students are continuing their studies living in the farm.
- d) The boarders of the Boys' Hostel and Girls' Hostel also have cultivated vegetables and have been able to minimise the mess dues taking vegetables from their own garden.

Present position of the Farm :

The college Farm has started its production since last year regularly. Though the production is not yet up to satisfaction, yet the farm has the following assets :—

- b) More accommodation will be provided for the poor students.

- c) Scholarship, free-studentships and other monetary helps will be given to the earner-learners.
- d) It is expected that the ideology of the farm will be fulfilled and the farm will give ample opportunity to the students to be self-sufficient with due regard for dignity of labour in educational institution for national development.

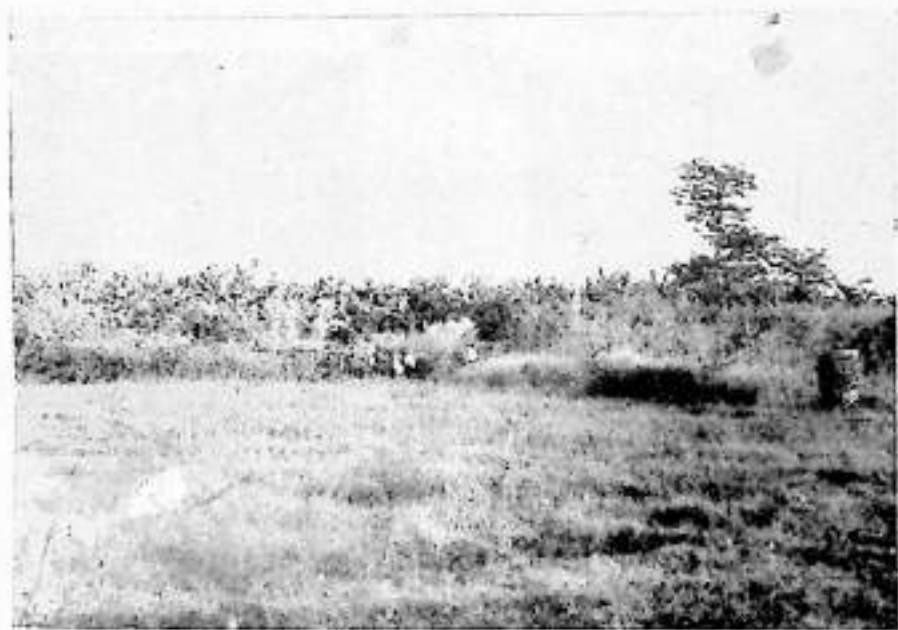

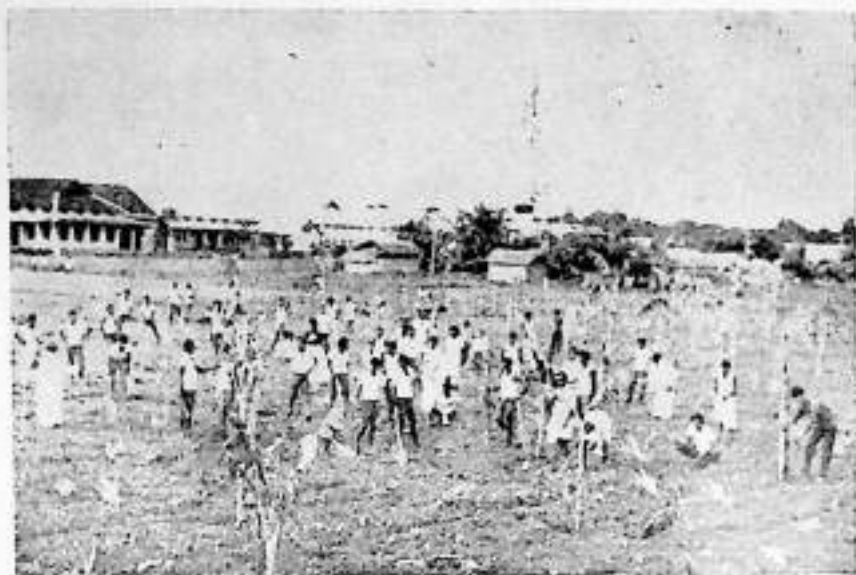
